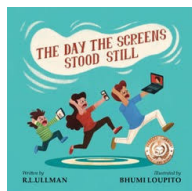




Take a moment to unplug and curl up with a great book!

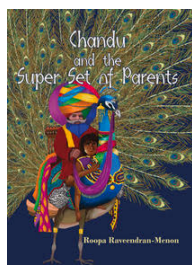

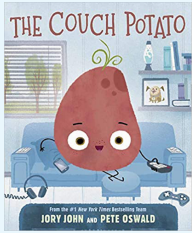


This is Not the Jess Show

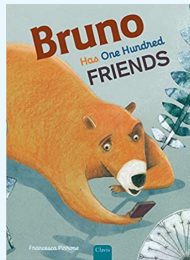
